Course Description: Bishvil Ha-Ivrit

This book is designed for students who can read and write Hebrew without vowels (*nikud*) and know about 150 basic Hebrew words, or are performing at the Novice level based on the ACTFL's Proficiency Guidelines *before* o;p starting this book

Upon completion of this book, most students will be able to listen, view, and read with **emerging** comprehension, write, and speak using the vocabulary, syntax, and morphology learned in the book about basic personal and social topics and contexts in this book with emerging fluency and accuracy and in multiple genres (prose, poetry, songs, Biblical verse and *midrash*, text messages, notes and more).

Content and Context

Where I live; map of Israel; central cities and regions in Israel (e.g. Jerusalem, Tel Aviv, the Negev and the Galil); city life/village life/kibbutz life; my school and schools in Israel; family trees; the Negev and desert life; parties; my room and home; my daily schedule and leisure activities; the Jewish daily schedule including prayer and time-bound commandments; food and restaurants; family and family events; encounters with Israeli teenagers through videos

Communicative Skills

Communicative tasks relate to basic personal information, personal preferences, daily activities, and some immediate needs.

Upon completion of this book, most students will be able to:

Interpretive (listening & reading comprehension)

- understand the main idea of simple conversations
- understand the main idea in short, simple texts on basic familiar topics and locations in Israel

Presentational (speaking and writing)

 present information in speech or writing on the most familiar topics using connected sentences

Interpersonal (spoken or written exchange)

- participate in conversations about familiar topics using sentences and series of sentences
- participate in short social interactions in everyday situations by asking and answering a variety of questions

Linguistic Knowledge

In order to interact with linguistic competence, students will investigate, explain, and reflect on the nature of language as a whole through comparison between the Hebrew language, their home language, and other languages they already know.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Attendance and Active Participation:

Becoming fluent in a language requires extensive, repeated exposure to that language. For this reason, attendance is essential in this class and is considered mandatory.

Attendance will be taken every day and calculated at the end of the year. Every 3 absences equals a letter grade off attendance grading.

Attendance weighs 15% of the total grade, you do not want to lose points.

<u>Tardiness to class:</u> Arriving more than 5 minutes late to class on three occasions will count as one missed class.

<u>Documentation must be provided for excused absences.</u>

Absences will be excused by UF policy. Acceptable and **documented** excuses include illness, religious holidays[see more below], & military obligation:

Except in the case of certified illness or other UF-accepted excuses, there will be no make-up option for missed exams and all missed assignments.

Active participation: Willingness to contribute to class discussions and to participate actively in group activities will be assessed in the final grade. Students experiencing difficulties that interfere with class attendance/performance are encouraged to speak with their instructor immediately and to contact a counselor at UMatterWeCare at www.umatter.ufl.edu.

Assignments and Assessments

• Homework/classwork: There will be a variety of assignments, mainly attached tasks on the lvrit IL website, throughout the semester. All assignments need to be turned in/submitted at the appropriate time and in the designated place. The attached tasks must be submitted on the lvrit IL website. If you are confused about how or when to turn in an assignment, please ask. There will be a 10% deduction in grade for each class day that it is late.

If you can't attend the class, please email the instructor to arrange a way for you to submit the work. Communication is most important. I do not accept late work without penalty.

- Quizzes: There will be quizzes during the semester. You will take the quiz during class.
- Presentation: There will be scheduled presentation days, in which students may
 work in pairs or as individuals. Clear instructions on presentation details and
 rubric will be provided.
- The final exam is cumulative and comprehensive. It will take place during the final exam week. In the past, I've done projects and oral proficiency interviews.

A note on learning a foreign language:

Research has shown that "people who take the initiative in learning (pro-active learners) learn more things and learn better than do people who sit at the feet of teachers, passively waiting to be taught (reactive learners).... They enter into learning more purposefully and with greater motivation" (Knowles, 1975). We, therefore, encourage you to take as active a role as possible in this class – do your homework daily; take full advantage of all materials accompanying the text; don't be afraid to ask questions or request clarification, and most importantly, ATTEND ALL CLASSES! Consider that the role of your teacher is not to "teach" you Hebrew, but to help you understand it on your terms – you are the only


