The course discusses the Israeli-Palestinian interactions focusing on the way collective identities are shaped by the conflict. It combines historical outlining of the conflict's development from the beginning of Zionist immigration to Palestine until the current day, with thematic analysis of its dynamics. The course juxtaposes different subjective points of view and motivations of the various actors involved and analyzes the socio-political process as products of these interrelated positions. Special emphasis is given to the significance of interdependency of culture and politics; national symbolism as both product of the conflict and an element that maintains it; and the significance of heroism, victimhood and martyrdom in shaping the conflict and the identities of the parties involved. Class meetings include lectures, movies, and discussions.

Assignments and Grading:

Attendance

The course is heavily based on class lectures, movies, and discussions. Therefore, class attendance is **mandatory**. Legitimate reasons for absence include only documented medical conditions or absences pre-approved by the instructor. Any other absence is considered an unexcused absence. You are allowed two unexcused absences but from the third unexcused absence you will lose one percentage point from your final grade for every meeting you miss. **Six unexcused absences or more will automatically result in failing the course.**

On-line commentary (20%)

Students are expected to post a short but thoughtful commentary (approximately 250 words) on ten reading items – **before** class. Five of these items should be submitted by 2/16 and five after 2/16. This assignment is an integral part of the learning process, and therefore late submissions will not be counted under any circumstances. The commentary should answer the question/s appearing on Canvas/Discussions under the relevant thread. If a question does not appear, the commentary should include one paragraph summarizing the main argument/s and one paragraph conveying your own perspective on the text. Grades will not be given to each report separately but twice during the semester, on 2/16 and at the end of the course.

Class participation (10%)

Consistent attendance is a necessary but not satisfactory condition for getting the maximal participation grade. You are expected to take an active part in the classroom, **based on your reading**. If you do not feel comfortable talking in public you can substitute it by the following options: reacting to your class-mate comments on the discussion board; submitting extra commentaries, beyond the ten required; submitting extra movie reviews.

Two movie reviews (2 x 5%)

Throughout the semester we will watch several documentary movies. You are required to submit a review of at least two of them, no later than 7 days after the screening. If you submit more than two reviews, the two highest grades will be counted toward your final grade. A review is not a summary - you are expected to write your thoughts about the movie as a student in the course 'Israelis and Palestinians'. The length should be approximately 400 words.

Quizzes (28%)

Throughout the semester you will be required to take four quizzes. Each quiz will take 10 minutes and its weight in the final grade is 7%. If you missed a quiz because of an unexcused absence you will not be able to make up for it.

Final take home exam (32%)

During the last class meeting, students will receive specific instructions for a final take home exam. The exam will be in the form of an essay in which students are expected to implement the knowledge they acquired in the classroom and the reading materials. The grade will reflect the student's knowledge of the course materials, the way she/he implements the theoretical concepts, and the level of organization and clarity of the arguments. Students will have three days to complete the assignment.
